




Competition Framework



Unfortunately, with these lower participant numbers, it meant the season had to be planned on a reduced budget, meaning we were not able to fulfil many of the initiatives we had in place.



- Club Equipment Maintenance


We'd encourage all members if they can assist, to offer their support ahead of the 2023 season.
